1. The Asia Pacific Futures Network (APFN) will conduct the **Asia Pacific Futures Network Virtual Conference 2020** on **November 19–21, 2020** via **Zoom** with the theme *Regenerating Asia 2050: Using Futures Literacy to Transform, Governance, Culture, and Economy*. The conference is chaired and hosted by the Philippine Futures Thinking Society (PhilFutures), and Department of Education (DepEd) is one of its knowledge partners.
2. Founded in 2016, APFN is a network of futures focused institutions and practitioners in the Asia Pacific Region. PhilFutures, on the other hand, is a professional futures organization in the Philippines established in 2020, which seeks to advance and democratize futures thinking through impact foresight education, research, training, and advocacy.
3. The APFN conferences gather key futurists and practitioners around the world to:
 - a. Explore how Asian perspectives and traditions, critically understood, inform Futures Studies;
 - b. Spread foresight from government focus to civil society, small businesses, and corporate sectors;
 - c. Strengthen existing informal networks;
 - d. Build a stronger link with other future-focused networks and international organizations around the world; and,
 - e. Explore emerging issues that might likely challenge current trajectories of the Asia-Pacific region.

The APFN Virtual Conference 2020 seeks to explore and accentuate:

- a. Case studies and presentations that demonstrate how futures literacy has influenced decision-making, planning, leadership and policy processes i.e., government, corporate, civic, non-government, communities, etc.;
- b. Perspectives, provocations, viewpoints, and visions of a regenerative Asia or a regenerative society in a post-pandemic or post-normal world;
- c. Sharing of new futures thinking concepts, tools, methods, processes, and innovations in foresight through virtual action-learning workshops, games, and talk sessions;
- d. State of the Future in Asia – preferred, emerging and alternative future worlds;
- e. Collaboration, networking, and stimulate learning and exchanges between and among futurists, practitioners, policy-makers, decision-makers, planners, academics, and participants who are new to the field of futures literacy and strategic foresight.

4. As one of the knowledge partners, DepEd is organizing a **Zoom Into the Futures session** of the conference on **November 19, 2020, 11:00 AM to 1:00 PM**, to evoke thought and spark discourse on alternative imaginings, preferred, and emergent visions of the futures of basic education in Asia, and in turn, preparing for a futures-ready basic education. The said session would also serve as platform for DepEd to launch its *Education Futures Programme*, the agency's response to the need for futures thinking in education, for readiness to confront the rapid changes, challenges, and opportunities of the future.

5. Interested participants may register through <https://apfn-hiraya.com/register-now/>. A conference registration fee of **One Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Pesos (Php1,250)** will be collected by the APFN per participant for the three-day conference.

6. Regional Directors are encouraged to identify appropriate representation among teachers and school leaders in their respective jurisdiction to attend the said conference **on official business**, provided that the time-on-task policy of the Department is complied with. Their registration fees shall be charged to the Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) and/or other DepEd local funds, pursuant to DBM Circular No. 563 dated April 22, 2016 and **subject to availability of funds** and the usual accounting and auditing rules and regulations.

7. Private elementary and secondary schools are also encouraged to consider participation in the conference.

CONCEPT NOTE

How might the futures of governance, culture, and economy look like from an Asian point of view? With its dizzying heterogeneity, can Asia grow coherently into the future? Can Asia curate a regenerative future in a post-pandemic or better yet post-normal world? How might that look like?

The global pandemic has disrupted the way policy-makers, researchers, decision-makers, business leaders, innovators, and strategists perceive and envision the future today, can Asia learn better, embed culture and use futures literacy to transform ways of knowing, imagining and creating alternative, preferable and emergent future worlds? What has changed, or perhaps what has emerged within the field and practice of foresight? Has the Asian way of learning and doing anticipatory thinking and governance arrived?

For the past several years, the Asia Pacific Futures Network (APFN) has explored and unpacked diverse themes and topics shaping the futures of Asia. Professional futurists, future-oriented think tanks, universities and institutions from the Philippines, Taiwan, Singapore, Malaysia, Brunei, Thailand, United Arab Emirates, South Korea, Kazakhstan, Bangladesh, Iran, China, Pakistan, India, Bangladesh, etc. have presented papers, shared case studies and pioneered participatory futures tools and methods to deconstruct, anticipate, and re-imagine the communities of futures thinking practices, education, leadership, the fourth industrial revolution, digital economy, decolonization, power and security systems in Asia. New insights and concepts, conversations, foresight programs, projects, initiatives, and actions came out of these conferences.

Previous APFN conferences were hosted and chaired by the Graduate Institute of Futures Studies at Tamkang University Taiwan, The Science and Technology Policy Institute of South Korea, The National Innovation Agency and Change Initiative in Thailand.

SESSION BRIEF

Modern technological breakthroughs and innovations are continuously changing the way we live. These changes bring uncertainty on what the future will look like—what ideas, knowledge and skills people will need to keep up in this fast-paced world. The standard of education quality is being challenged, and with the global pandemic that struck our world, education is rapidly accelerating its transition towards the future.

Basic education plays a key role in equipping our children and youth with the knowledge, skills, and attributes that will prepare them for tomorrow. Education systems must therefore be oriented towards this direction. Education must evolve to adapt to the challenges of the future while taking into consideration its humanistic aspects—the elements that differentiate humans from artificial intelligence (AI) and robots.

Amid widening income disparities, promoting equity and supporting disadvantaged children and youth through reimagining basic education, improving access and quality, and strengthening education systems could help them achieve better academic outcomes, and in turn, help reduce income inequality in the future.

As an official knowledge partner in the 6th Asia-Pacific Futures Network Virtual Conference, the Department of Education (DepEd) of the Philippines is hosting a breakout session to evoke thought and spark discourse on alternative imaginings, preferred, and emergent visions of the futures of basic education in Asia, and in turn, preparing for a futures-ready basic education.
